	The Office of the Chief Clinical Officer (OoCCO) was established as part of an overall
	investment by the HSE to strengthen governance and accountability for the planning and
	delivery of high-quality services with the aim of driving transformational change across our
	healthcare system through clinical leadership, design of new models of care, promotion of
	a culture of safety and quality improvements; through patient and service user involvement.
	The Clinical Design and Innovation (CDI) function, reporting to the National Clinical Director
	of Integrated Care, within of the Office of the CCO (OoCCO) provides Clinical Innovation,
	Design Leadership and Direction to strategic decisions across HSE Strategy & Planning,
	HSE Operations and the wider organisation.
	A National Clinical Director of Integrated Care (NCDIC) leads and directs the Clinical Design
	and Innovation Team, and supports other CCO activities including the corporate plan
	development, modelling demand and capacity, amongst others. This ensures the work of
	the Team and the National Clinical Programmes develops an integrated care approach in
	the design, planning and delivery of the health services with evidence-informed clinical
	participation to support population needs assessment, service design, planning and the
	implementation of person-centred, clinically effective, safe care valued by patients, service
	users and their families.
	The responsibilities of CDI include:



- Engaging with the clinical community to promote integrated care approaches, develop sustainable service and clinical excellence across the health services;
- Develop service design and models of care that are patient-centred, populationbased, multi-disciplinary and demonstrate integration across all service domains;
- Lead the development of Clinical Governance frameworks and guidance;
- Lead the work of the National Clinical Advisor and Group Lead (NCAGLS) and National Clinical Programmes in line with Sl\u00e4intecare goals.

The work of the National Clinical Programmes (NCPs) needs to be aligned to HSE priorities and to respond to the principles of Sláintecare. In line with Goal 2 of the Sláintecare Implementation Plan; the NCPs will support the design of models of care which support high-quality, accessible and safe care that meets the needs of the population. To this end, the NCPs should be the primary reference point for providing cross-service and cross-programme solutions in relation to:

- New models/pathways of care based on population need;
- Clinical components of community-based care expansion;
- Acute and Unscheduled Care Development;
- Integrated end-to-end models of care.

NCAGL Structure:

The core role of the Office of the NCAGL in Primary Care is to provide clinical leadership and guidance to effect the development and implementation of best practice care pathways and models of care and a coordinated approach to integrated, patient-centred care that is sustainable into the future.

The NCAGL of Primary Care provides clinical leadership and advice on care to HSE Strategy and Planning, HSE Operations, CCO, ICL and the HSE EMT. In addition to Quality & Patient Safety, Scheduled Care, Hospital Group CEO's, the National Ambulance Service, Organ Donation & Transplant Ireland, Unscheduled Care and Specialist Acutes.

Details of the Programme

National Clinical Programme for Ophthalmology

The aim of the National Clinical Programme for Ophthalmology programme is the development and expansion of HSE delivered ophthalmology services, both to meet the growing and changing needs of patients and to do so in a way that incorporates and reflects evolving practice.

The programme designed the blueprint for the reconfiguration of ophthalmology services which in its essence has 3 main components;

- 1. Develop and expand specialty care outside of the acute hospitals
- 2. Develop and expand the multi-disciplinary team
- 3. Expand surgical capacity

The modernized care pathways are a continuation of the work that began in ophthalmology back in 2012, with new funding helping to develop capacity in the Primary Care Centres to drive the integration with the existing hospital delivered specialty services.

A key programme of work for the NCP for Ophthalmology is the implementation of a national clinical management system for ophthalmology.

Programme supports are provided through the Irish College of Ophthalmologists including an Advisory Group and programme management support. A multi-disciplinary working group will also be convened.

Reporting Relationship

Reporting to:

- ICO Council and its designate the CEO of the ICO
- Primary Care National Clinical Advisor Group Lead (NCAGL), Clinical Design & Innovation (CDI), Office of the Chief Clinical Officer (CCO).
